PREFACE

The Kenya Government recognizes the importance of Labour Market Information (LMI) in regard to employment planning, policy development and facilitation of labour mobility within the country, regional and globally. The development of a domesticated standard for classification of occupations in the country in the year 2000 – the Kenya National Occupational Classification Standard (KNOCS-2000) - was a manifestation of this resolve.

Given the dynamics in the labour market and the standard practice of periodic reviewing of Standards at the International Labour Organization (ILO) – from which this Standard is adopted – the KNOCS-2000 has been revised to the Kenya Standard Classification of Occupations (**KeSCO-2022**). The document presented here is the updated standard reference of occupations in Kenya and supersedes the previous version.

KeSCO-2022 is a compendium for occupational information available in the Kenyan economy. The standard gives an insight into the occupational framework: type of work performed in jobs found in establishments, industry or a country; nature of tasks performed ;body of knowledge, skills and skill level required for a job holder to effectively perform those tasks. Precisely, KeSCO -2022 standard defines, describes and assigns unique codes to all occupations, in order to classify them as they are found within the Kenya labour market and in a comparable level globally.

In this era of globalization, changing technology and business practices, shifts in the demand for our goods and services will continue to shape Kenya's labour market. This will in turn call for comprehensive, up-to-date and reliable information on the labour market. Specifically, occupational information will:

1. Facilitate collection of occupational information: sort jobs and persons into occupations to produce statistics on the occupational description of employed and unemployed persons, wages, working conditions and occupational injuries;

- 2. Aid assessment of the country's manpower situation, labour market information and needs: avail policy makers and administrators occupational definitions which will enable them understand, implement and monitor the effect of economic and social policies and facilitate planning of human resource development in the country;
- 3. Give researchers and the general public occupational classifications to enable them analyze, describe and gain knowledge on what is happening in their country;
- 4. Provide immigration authorities with information to facilitate decision making on issuance of work permits;
- 5. Assist organizations involved in job placement and other employment services to execute their mandates: enable them to sort persons and jobs to match job seekers and vacancies;
- 6. Facilitate cross-border occupational comparisons for effective regional integration and Labour Migration
- 7. Facilitate managers of enterprises/organizations to sort jobs and persons and manage wage and other personnel policies, as well as monitor working conditions;
- 8. Provide school-leavers and job seekers with information on various types of work, training requirements, career prospects and working conditions;
- 9. Provide career masters and vocational counsellors with information to appropriately advise school-leavers and job seekers on the job market;
- 10. Give vocational training specialists a basis for planning and designing vocational training programmes;
- 11. Provide a basis for international comparison and exchange of statistical and administrative data on occupations and;

12. Provide Kenyans with information on labour activities classified by occupations.

It is therefore my conviction, that KeSCO – 2022 edition and subsequent versions will go a long way in bridging observed gaps in labour market information and provide a comprehensive system for classifying and aggregating occupational information for effective human resource planning, development and utilization.

Finally, it is my earnest hope that this up-dated document, will answer the quest for information on careers and jobs in the Labour Market.

KeSCO 2022 PART 1 INTRODUCTORY NOTES

1. NATURE, OBJECTIVES AND DEVELOPMENT OF KeSCO-2022

1.1. Introduction

- 1. The Kenya government unveiled Vision 2030 as the blueprint to steer the country's term development over period 2008-2030. Through the Vision the government aspires to make Kenya a newly industrialized middle income country that shall provide high quality life for all its citizens by the year 2030. The economic, social and political pillars of Vision 2030 are anchored on human resource development; enhanced equity and wealth creation. The Kenya government recognizes the critical role of labour and employment in achieving Vision 2030 goals. Attainment of global competitiveness and high quality of life, as envisaged in the Vision 2030, hinges greatly on the extent to which a country nurtures, develops and utilizes her human resources, and the degree of efficiency of its labour market
- 2. Occupational information and particularly classification is a critical component of Human Resource planning, development and utilization. It facilitates assessment of levels of Manpower in the economy, informs job matching by employment agencies and jobseekers and provides career information for labour market entrants. It also gives guidance on the development of labour market policies, particularly those which relate to the promotion of work-based training. While there are substantial benefits to be gained from using a single classification of occupations, these gains can only realized if the occupational classification is up to date and available on timely basis.

1.2. Overview of KeSCO-2022

- **3.** The Kenya Standard Classification of Occupation 2022(KeSCO-2022) is a revision of the Kenya National Occupational Classification Standard 2000 (KNOCS-2000), which it supersedes.
- 4. The Standard is a compendium for occupational information available in the Kenyan economy and provides an insight into the occupational framework: type of work performed in jobs found in establishments, industry or a country; nature of tasks performed; body of knowledge, skills and skill level required for a job holder to effectively perform those tasks. Precisely, KeSCO 2022 standard defines describes and assigns unique codes to all occupations, in order to classify them as they are found within the Kenya labour market.
- **5.** KeSCO-2022 provides a system for classifying and aggregating occupational information obtained from manpower surveys, employment services and other statistical surveys as well as administrative records.

- 6. KeSCO-2022 is a Five-level hierarchically structured classification that allows all jobs in the Kenyan economy to be classified into 5079 occupational titles. These titles form the most detailed level of the classification structure and are further aggregated into 436 unit groups, 125 minor groups, 42 sub-major groups and 10 major groups based on their similarity in tasks performed, skill level and skill specialization required for the jobs. The Standard allows the production of relatively detailed internationally comparable data as well as summary information for only 10 groups at the highest level of aggregation
- 7. Each occupational title in the classification is designated by a unique six-digit code number and is associated with a unit group that specifies the skill, body of knowledge and key competencies required for efficient and effective performance of tasks in the unit group. A hyphen is introduced after the first four digits in-order to create a distinction between the occupational title and the unit group. The definitions also summarize the broad descriptions of the unit group and main tasks performed. The complete hierarchal structure definitions of the KeSCO-2022, comprising titles and codes for occupations, unit groups, minor groups, sub-major groups and major groups are here-in presented.
- 8. The classification Standard has been developed and adopted as the reference occupational classification standard for Kenya by the Department of National Human Resource Planning and Development (NHRPD), the Ministry of Labour and Social Protection, in collaboration with the Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) and stakeholders from training institutions, workers organization and industry. The process also received technical support from the ILO occupational expert.
- 9. In its development, the task team made references to the International Standard Classification of Occupations (ISCO-08), the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations(ASCO), the India National Classification of Occupations -2015(NCO and the Kenya National Qualification Framework (KNQF)). The use of ISCO-08 as a reference was to make the document conform to the International standard to facilitate international comparison of occupations; while the use of KNQF as a reference was to map KeSCO-22 skill levels to the national qualification framework.
- **10.** This introduction describes the KeSCO-2022 overview, main objectives, its history, revision process and definition of groups

1.3. Main objectives of KeSCO-2022

11. The primary mission of the KeSCO-2022 is to establish a comprehensive system for classifying and aggregating occupational information for effective human resource planning, development and utilization, taking cognizance of the increased demand for internationally comparable occupational data for both statistical and administrative purposes due to globalization. This

emphasizes the need to collect and analyze data on the labour market to keep track of the occupations`

- **12.** KeSCO has five main objectives, namely to:
 - a) Facilitate the collection of comprehensive occupational information for statistical purposes;
 - b) Facilitate the assessment of the Kenyan manpower structure and labour market information as well as for the planning of human resource development in the country. This includes providing a rational basis for manpower inventory and efforts to match the skills output from the training/education system with jobs so that institutional planners can ensure that training programmes become responsive to labour market demands:
 - c) Assist those organizations involved in job placement and other employment services (manpower utilization) to execute their mandates;
 - d) Facilitate career guidance for students, parents or job seekers on the job market;
 - e) Facilitate cross-border occupational comparisons brought about by the need by countries to export labour and to form various regional economic associations which have made the labour market to become international in outlook and to enhance effective regional integration and;
 - f) Provide a basis for international comparison and exchange of statistical and administrative data on occupations.

1.4. Historical background

13. The development of the Kenya Standard Classification of Occupations dates back to several decades ago. The first attempt by the Kenya Government to establish a national occupational classification system was made in 1976 through the defunct Kenyanization of Personnel Bureau (KPB) as a tool for carrying out manpower inventory. It was largely used for collection of labour market information at the employment exchanges. Since then the classification has been revised several times for use in various studies including the 1982/83 and 1986/88 National Manpower Surveys. The publication of the report of the National Manpower Survey 1986/88 report recommended that improvements be carried out on the KNOCS used during the exercise, after it was observed that it had a number of noticeable shortcomings. One of the major shortcomings was that the definitions in the 1986 version of KNOCS were quite limited and therefore needed further refinement.

- 14. The 1986/88 standard was revised and aligned to ISCO 88 to produce the Kenya National Standard Classification of Occupations (KNOCS) in the year 2000. These revisions had been carried out as joint efforts of the Ministry of Labour, the Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) and the National Manpower Development Committee Secretariat that was then domiciled in the Ministry of Labour and Human Resource Development.
- 15. KNOCS 2000 was therefore a restructured and up-dated/improved version of KNOCS 86 which in turn was an expanded version of the one used during the 1982 Manpower Survey. In the revised KNOCS, attempts were made to give clear descriptions of the work usually performed by those who belong to the occupation. Precise explanations of how and why the work is done and what is involved in the process, were also given in most cases. The general functions of some occupations were followed by an enumeration of the main tasks performed, wherever possible and throughout its
- **16.** In the compilation of KNOCS 2000, there was conscious effort to make the document to conform as closely as possible to the International Standard Classification of Occupations (ISCO) -1988 for purposes of international comparisons.
- 17. The standard was published and disseminated to stakeholders through workshops and other media forums. Since then, it had been widely used by government departments, researchers and other stakeholders as a system for classifying and aggregating occupational information. The Kenya National Bureau of Statistics uses KNOCS in various establishment and household based surveys to classify occupations. KNOCS was also used during the National Manpower survey 2010/2011, Study of Training in Local Institutions 2016/2017, Informal Sector Skills and Occupations Survey 2019/2020 and Enterprise Skills and Occupations Survey 2022/2023.

1.5. Rationale for Updating KNOCS -2000

18. Since its development a number of changes have since taken place. The labour market continues to experience considerable dynamism in skill acquisition, occupational title description and utilization. New occupations, new titles and more modern work processes have also emerged, particularly as a result of technological change. This is more so in respect to occupations involved in provision of goods and services related to information and Communication Technology. Regional and economic integration, globalization and general economic growth and development have also led to emergence of new occupations, expansions in the existing ones and contraction in certain occupations. Changes in the National education system and National Qualifications framework has brought a new dimension in KNOCS skill Concept. The drive for productivity and competiveness and the new human resource

- management paradigm have also necessitated multi-skilling and multi-tasking with resultant outcome being re-definition of occupations and emergence of new ones.
- 19. In subsequent occupational studies, it became apparent that there was need to update KNOCS-2000 to reflect changes in the occupational structure in the world of work, as well as to address the emerging issues. The revised standard will enhance production of comprehensive, accurate and timely data on occupation and their classifications necessary for effective human resource planning, development and utilization.
- 20. After the revision process, KNOCS-2000 was superseded by Kenya Standard Classification of Occupations (KeSCO-2022). These revisions have been carried out as joint effort of the Ministry of labour and Social protection through the department of National Human resource planning and Development (NHRPD) in the state department of Labour and Skills Development and; the Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) with the support of the world Bank World.
- 21. This version of KeSCO is a compendium for occupational information available in the Kenyan economy and provides an insight into the occupational framework: type of work performed in jobs found in establishments, industry or a country; nature of tasks performed ;body of knowledge, skills and skill level required for a job holder to effectively perform those tasks. Precisely, KeSCO -2022 standard defines describes and assigns unique codes to all occupations, in order to classify them as they are found within the Kenya labour market
- 22. The major difference between KeSCO-2022 and its predecessor, in mainly in the hierarchical levels (structure). It has five levels as opposed to the four levels as was there before: Major, Submajor, Minor and unit groups followed by Occupational titles. The unit group was not there in the previous standard. Some other changes are: expansion or contraction at some occupational groups; slight changes in names of some major groups; provision of adequate information describing all occupations at sub-major and minor group levels; attaching skill levels to major 1 and more specifically sub-major group 12, 13 and 14.

1.6. The Revision Process

- 23. The process of updating of KNOCS-2000 was spear-headed by the department of National Human Resource Planning and Development in the State department of Labour and Social Protection in collaboration with key stakeholders including Kenya National Bureau of Statistics, line government ministries and departments, education and Training Institutions, Employers and Workers organizations and representatives from universities through the support of the World Bank (Kenya Youth Employment and Opportunities Project-KYEOP)
- **24.** An important component of the work was the establishment of the task team which also acted as the secretariat. The team was tasked to undertake the following activities:-

- Review any existing documents as related to the Kenya National Occupation Classifications;
- Development of revision proposal paper detailing the study design and methodology to be used in updating KNOCS based on previous experiences and recommendations from the National Manpower Survey 2011 report and other administrative records.
- Stakeholder engagement for views on the subject matter
- Data collection, analysis, compilation and preparation of draft classification structure for comments by stake holders
- Harmonization of description to conform to current employers and industry requirements including developing a dictionary of occupational titles
- Update the National Classification Standard taking into account developments in the world of work
- Align the National Classification to the International Standard of Classification of Occupations 2008 (ISCO-08)
- Design and implement a system for capturing emerging skills and combination of tasks on a continuous basis for future reviews of National Occupational Classifications

1.7. Revision Methodology

- **25.** The revision of KNOCS 2000 was modeled on the lines of ISCO- 08 to allow for international comparisons and these means that the changes that will be carried out to KNOCS 2000 entailed:
 - Inclusion of new categories of occupations that warrant separate groups in KNOCS to be done at the appropriate level in the classification structure at the minor group level.
 - Combination of existing minor groups that no longer warrant separate identification and deleting those that are inappropriate.
 - Redrafting of existing occupational titles and their tasks where necessary.
 - To conform to the international classification standard it is recommended that the basic principles and structure of KNOCS 2000 should be maintained. This implies that the same major groups at the top level of aggregation shall remain and so will the sub-major groups of classifications.
- **26.** The major issues that were addressed in the revision work included but were not limited to:
 - the impact of information and communication technology on the occupational structure of the Kenyan labour market;

- the need for improved coverage of health occupations;
- the need to include new categories of occupations that warranted separate groups at the appropriate minor group level;
- The need to combine existing minor groups that no longer warranted to exist as separate occupational groups;
- the need for redrafting of existing occupational titles and their tasks where necessary;
- the need to model and align the occupational classification standard to ISCO-08;
- the need to have gender neutral occupational titles;
- the need to map the occupational standard to the national qualification framework;
- the need to cater for two levels of government brought about by promulgation of a new constitution;
- the need for improved coverage of occupations that predominated in the informal sector and occupations with low skill requirements;
- the need to update definitions of all categories; and
- the need to have occupational titles that are culturally acceptable to the Kenyan citizens.
- **27.** The revision entailed a myriad of activities that spanned over 5 years from 2017 to 2022 key amongst them being: wide and extensive stakeholder consultations and engagements. The process was conducted in four elaborate phases:
 - a) preparatory activities;
 - **b)** data gathering and revision of the standard;
 - c) sectoral validation and;
 - **d)** Finalization and maintenance of the standard.
- **28.** The preparatory phase consisted of the following activities in a chronological order:
 - a) 2017: Review of the Concept paper; Development of Road Map
 - b) 2018: Engagement of ILO for Technical assistance
 - c) 2019: Consultant came on board in 2019
 - d) 2019: Review of administrative records, identification of gaps and development of revision guidelines
- **29.** Data gathering and revision of the standard was the next phase and it entailed:
 - a) Reviewing of administrative records such as National Manpower Survey Reports, Informal Sector Skills and Occupations Survey Report, ISCO-08 and other Occupational Classification Standards. Key findings from such studies indicated that there were a number of occupational titles in labour market that had not been captured

- in KNOCS-2000, most of which were in the information Communication Technology sector :
- Mapping KNOCS 2000 to ISCO 08 and Identifying the Gaps;
- c) Soliciting and reviewing of stakeholders inputs;
- d) Occupational Research (Blue Economy, ICT and Manufacturing);
- e) Linking KESCO Skill levels to KNQF and;
- f) Development of draft revised classification structure, Manual and classification structure and definitions of categories.
- **30.** In the sectoral validation phase, the draft report (emanating from the data gathering phase) was subjected to validation by the following key labour market stakeholders:
 - a) ICT stakeholders;
 - b) Education and training stakeholders;
 - c) Employers and Workers Representatives;
 - d) Manufacturing Sector Stakeholders and;
 - e) Health Sector Stakeholders
- **31.** The finalization and maintenance phase entailed activities such as:
 - a) Publication and dissemination of the revised KeSCO, User Manual;
 - b) Development of coding procedures computerized coding system;
 - c) Maintenance and update of coding structure and;
 - d) Development of an interactive platform for feedback and user assistance

1.8. Definition of groups

- **32.** KESCO-2022 is arranged in a hierarchical order with the broad category of the classification at the top and the lowest category at the bottom. This hierarchical order is applied across all the major groups (10) as explained hereunder:
 - **The Major Group**-This is the top most aggregated occupational level of the classification in the standard followed by,
 - The Sub-major group- which is an expansion of the major group to allow room for more occupational information to be included.
 - **The Minor group** is a further expansion of the sub-major group to include finer details of the occupational information.
 - The Unit group-is a further expansion of minor-group to include more occupational information about occupational titles

 Occupation title -is the most detailed level of the classification of the classification structure and allows all jobs in the Kenyan economy to be classified into 5079 occupational titles.

33. Summary of major groups:

a) MAJOR GROUP 1: LEGISLATORS, ADMINISTRATORS AND MANAGERS

This group consists of occupations that are basically concerned with planning, formulation and interpretation of policy in the public and private sectors. The main tasks include responsibility for decision-making and in directing the management of their respective organizations or enterprises to ensure that the established objectives are realized. It has 4 sub-major groups which are divided into 14 minor groups which are further divided into 33 unit groups and the latter are disaggregated further into 296 occupational titles.

b) MAJOR GROUP 2: PROFESSIONALS

Professionals covers occupations whose main tasks require a high level of professional knowledge and experience in the fields of physical and life sciences, or social sciences and humanities. The main tasks consist of increasing the existing stock of knowledge, applying scientific and artistic concepts and theories to the solution of problems and teaching the foregoing in a systematic manner. It has 6 sub-major groups which are divided into 32 minor groups which are further divided into 93 unit groups and the latter are disaggregated further into 829 occupational titles.

c) MAJOR GROUP 3: TECHNICIANS AND ASSOCIATE PROFESSIONALS

Technicians and Associate Professionals group covers those occupations whose main tasks require sound educational background and proper training, and whose main tasks require the experience and knowledge of principles and practices necessary to assume operational responsibility and to give technical support to professionals. It has 6 sub-major groups which are divided into 21 minor groups which are further divided into 84 unit groups and the latter are disaggregated further into 1020 occupational titles.

d) MAJOR GROUP 4: SECRETARIAL, CLERICAL SERVICES AND RELATED WORKERS

Occupations covered in this group have main tasks that require the knowledge and experience necessary to record, organize, store and retrieve information. It further involves the computation of numerical, financial and statistical data and a number of client-oriented clerical duties. It has also connection with money-handling operations, travel management,

business information and appointments. It also involves performing secretarial tasks. . It has 4 sub-major groups which are divided into 8 minor groups which are further divided into 28 unit groups and the latter are disaggregated further into 334 occupational titles.

e) MAJOR GROUP 5: SERVICE, SHOP AND MARKET SALES WORKERS.

This group covers occupations mainly concerned with performing services related to and experience necessary to provide the everyday needs of families and other the knowledge groups of individuals. The tasks require protective service, personal services related to travel, housekeeping, catering and personal care. It also includes those tasks which involve selling goods in shops, demonstration of goods and modeling. It has 4 sub-major groups which are divided into 14 minor groups which are further divided into 38 unit groups and the latter are disaggregated further into 403 occupational titles.

f) MAJOR GROUP 6: SKILLED AGRICULTURAL, FORESTRY AND FISHERY WORKERS

The group covers occupations related to agriculture, animal husbandry and fishing. The main tasks therefore require the knowledge and experience necessary to grow and harvest crops, breed, feed or hunt animals, gather wild fruit and plants, catch or breed fish, cultivate or gather other forms of aquatic life. This group includes those functions which are meant for both domestic and commercial purposes. It has 3 sub-major groups which are divided into 9 minor groups which are further divided into 18 unit groups and the latter are disaggregated further into 353 occupational titles.

g) MAJOR GROUP 7: CRAFT AND RELATED TRADES WORKERS

The group covers those occupations concerned with extracting of raw materials, manufacture and repair of goods. It also covers the tasks of construction, maintenance and repair of roads, structures and machinery. The main tasks involved in this group require experience with, and understanding of the work situation, the materials worked with, the requirements of the structures, machinery and other items produced. It also comprises printing works, processing of food stuffs, textiles, wooden or metal handicrafts. It has 5 submajor groups which are divided into 14 minor groups which are further divided into 67 unit groups and the latter are disaggregated further into 514 occupational titles.

h) MAJOR GROUP 8: PLANT AND MACHINE OPERATORS AND ASSEMBLERS

This group covers occupations whose main tasks require the knowledge and experience that will enable one to operate vehicles and other mobile equipment. It also requires the knowledge and skills to tend, control and monitor the operation of industrial plant and

machinery. This may also be on the spot or by remote control. The skills needed may enable one to assemble products from component parts according to strict rules and procedures. These occupations require experience with and an understanding of the machinery worked with. The tasks involved may call for understanding of all stages and the nature and purpose for specifications and procedures. It has 3 sub-major groups which are divided into 14 minor groups which are further divided into 40 unit groups and the latter are disaggregated further into 912 occupational titles.

i) MAJOR GROUP 9: ELEMENTARY OCCUPATIONS

This major group covers occupations which require the knowledge and experience necessary to perform mostly simple and routine tasks, involving the use of simple hand-held tools and in some cases certain physical effort. With few exceptions they may require only limited personal initiative or judgment. The occupations have been divided into 6 sub-major groups which are divided into 11 minor groups which are further divided into 33 unit groups and the latter are disaggregated further into 416 occupational titles.

j) MAJOR GROUP O: ARMED FORCES

This is a group of occupations whose main tasks consist of carrying out military operations undertaken as collective defense measures. It also requires skills which enable the process of preparing and training to deter military aggression; surveillance and protection of national territory, airspace and coastal waters. It also involves the art of providing aid to civilian authorities as requested in the event of civil disorder, natural disaster and other. It excludes such groups like police (except military police), customs, border or armed civilian services. This major group is disaggregated to only four (4) occupational units. One Sub-major group, one Minor group, one unit group and one occupational title.


1.9. Kenya Standard Classification of Occupations Coding Structure

- **34.** The process of developing the KeSCO-2022 occupational classification standard resulted into two products:
 - a) KeSCO-2022, User Manual and;
 - **b)** KeSCO, Coding structure.

The coding structure is a five-level hierarchically structured occupational classification that is aggregated into: major group, sub-major group, minor group, unit group and occupational titles. Each lower level of detail identifies a more specific group of occupations. There are 10 major groups which are broken into 42 sub-major groups, 125 minor groups, which, in turn, are divided into 436 unit groups under, which, 5079 occupational titles are attached. Each occupational title is designated

by a six-digit unique code and hyphen between the fo urth and fifth digit is used only for clarity about unit group and occupational title.

- **35.** The main purpose and uses of the coding structure are:
 - to categorize all job in the Kenyan economy into occupational titles;
 - to help users of KeSCO to find particular categories in the classification and determine where particular occupations are classified;
 - to assist in understanding the relationship between categories in the classification;
 - to serve as a model for and act as a starting point in , the development of occupational coding structures, for national classifications based on KeSCO and;
 - to be used directly to assign responses in statistical collections to KeSCO in occupational studies by researchers and other data users.

1.10. KeSCO Conceptual Framework

- **36.** The conceptual framework adopted for Kenya Standard Classification of Occupations (KeSCO), was largely the same one used for KNOCS-2000. The kind of work performed or job, competence and skill are the three concepts applied.
- **37.** A job has been defined as a set of tasks or duties executed or meant to be executed (in the case of unfilled jobs), by one person; while a set of jobs which have the same main tasks and duties has been defined as an occupation.
- 38. Competency is the ability to perform specific tasks effectively and efficiently within an occupation; combining the three aspects of skills, knowledge and ability. In KeSCO, occupations that require similar basic skills and competencies are classified within the same unit group. For example, Teacher Kindergarten, Pre-School Teacher and Early Childhood Educator are classified in Unit Group 2342: Early Childhood Development Teachers.
- **39.** A trade is a highly focused training program specifically designed to prepare one for a job in a skilled area.
- **40.** A Qualification is a pass in an examination or completion of a course especially one that confers recognition of the holder as a practitioner of a profession or activity.
- **41.** A Training is teaching or developing in oneself or others, it's any skills, knowledge or fitness that relates to specific useful competency.
- **42.** A Course is a typically smaller part of training. To do a training, one may need to complete a multiple of courses.
- **43.** Apprentices/Indentured Learners is regulated and structured (both formal and informal) learning. It is a training in that there is no known training provider/institution and hence is conducted at employer's premises using the work place tools and equipment and the skilled staff as trainers.

1.11. KeSCO Skill Concept

- **44.** Skill is defined as the ability to carry out the tasks and duties of a given job. In KeSCO, skill is viewed in two dimensions as:
 - a) Skill Level which is a function of the complexity and range of the tasks and duties involved; and
 - b) Skills Specialization which is defined by the field of knowledge required, the tools and machinery used, the materials worked on or with, as well as the kinds of goods and services produced.
- **45.** Occupational groups classified by KNOCS 2000 were delineated and aggregated on a skill concept that had five skill levels as below.

- 46. The skill concept in KNOCS-2000 was defined based on then existing formal Kenyan education/training system. Secondly, workers who failed to join or complete primary education were not considered within this concept. This created inadequacies in that skills that are often acquired through non-formal and informal learning i.e., on-the-job training, indentured learning, and/or previous experience were ignored. Although KNOCS-2000 recognizes that skills may be, and often are, acquired through informal training and experience this was not reflected in the five skill levels stated.
- **47.** Furthermore, changes in Basic Education Framework to suit the new Competence Based Curriculum (CBC) and the Competence Based Education and Training (CBET) under the Tertiary Vocational Education and Training (TVET) institutions resulted to more mismatch with the KNOCS-2000 skill concept.
- **48.** The above shortcomings prompted a review of the KNOCS-2000 five to four skill levels. The review was done by aligning and mapping KeSCO skill levels onto Kenya National Qualification Framework (NQKF) learning outcomes. The Qualification Framework outlines ten level learning outcomes each identified by a unique set of Level/Performance Descriptors for Standardization Criteria/Competencies to help coordinate and harmonize the various levels of education/training. These ensures a seamless linkage between education qualification, Knowledge, Skills and Competencies within KeSCO occupations. The framework specifically outlines:
 - a) Academic, vocational and/or skills pathways that could be formal, non-formal and informal and:
 - b) Performance descriptors required for competent performance of tasks and duties in an occupation.

49. In KeSCO, the skill concept is applied mainly at the Major, Sub-Major and Minor Groups Levels of the classification. Occupational classification lays emphasis to the nature of the work, the complexity of tasks performed and skills required in an occupation rather than the education and/or training requirement. A worker may further his/her training/education within the same skill level however this may not a measure whether a worker is more or less skilled than the other workers within the occupation. Competencies required for effective and efficient performance of tasks within occupations are stated at the Unit Group levels.

50. The skill levels are matched to the Major Groups as summarized below.

1.15. MAJOR CHANGES BETWEEN KNOCS 2000 AND KESCO 2022

1.16. Summary Changes

- 51. KeSCO-22 maintains the conceptual model used in developing its predecessor KNOCS 2000. However, there are significant changes on the treatment of some occupational groups. This was to address the difficulties that were experienced in the use of KNOCS 2000 and also to incorporate the occupational changes that have come up in the last 21 years since the publication of KNOCS 2000.
- 52. Overall, the conceptual structure of the major groups, the sub-major groups and the minor groups in the classification are maintained. The names of some major groups have been changed slightly so as to more clearly indicate their content, and some minor groups have been moved from one major group to another. KeSCO-22 has also incorporated the 4th level of classifications which is called the unit group. This was necessitated by the expansion of the occupational coding system from the 5 digits to 6-digit codes. The expansion was to allow assignment of unique codes to each occupational title so as to ease data collection and analysis. The unit groups in KeSCO 22 were created as an extension of the minor groups in KNOCS 2000. It's the lowest level of the classification where the occupations are attached and defined.
- 53. KeSCO 22 has completely new sub-major groups and minor groups introduced at the same time some sub-major and Minor groups have been merged. In most of the changes, concern was that KNOCS-2000 is outdated in some areas due to change in the work processes, advanced technology, redundancy and use of gender-neutral titles e.g. chairman and chairperson. This was more pronounced in relation to the use of Information and Communication Technology. (ICT)
- **54.** KeSC0-22 has attached skill levels in the structure of the document at the first three levels whereas the competencies for performance in the occupations are provided at the fourth level. This is a departure from KNOCS 2000 which had the skill levels attached at the Major group level.

Significant changes by Major groups.

55. Major Group 1 Legislators, Administrators and Managers

➤ With the promulgation of the new constitution, two levels of governments were created. This therefore meant that occupational groups in Major group 1: Legislators, Administrators and

Managers had to be expanded to include the new occupations that came up with the constitution.

- Some group names in the Major group are slightly changed to provide for more inclusivity of the occupations and the tasks performed
- Additional minor groups were created to cater for senior government officials who head the national and county governments and unit groups introduced alongside them. These changes were more focused on the structures of the National and County Governments that are in the new constitution.
- ➤ Sub-Major group 11 and 12: in KNOCS 2000 were merged and expanded to include occupations in the County government under Sub- Major group 11: Legislators, Chief Executives and Senior Government Officials in KeSCO-22.
- KNOCS 2000 Minor group 122: Senior officials of special interest groups is now Minor group 113 in KeSCO 22.
- ➤ The Corporate managers sub-major 13: in KNOCS 2000 was renamed to Production and Specialized managers sub- major group 13:in KeSCO 22. This group now includes managers who not only perform managerial tasks but are also able to guide the technical processes in their area of operation.
- ➤ Other Administrators and Managers sub-major group 15: in KNOCS 2000 is now minor group 143 in KeSCO-22: This group include all other administrators and managers who could not be classified in either of the groups due to them not being so significant and extensive.

56. Major Group 2: Professionals

- ➤ Professionals are classified in Major group 2 in KeSCO-22. These include all who carry out professional tasks and duties irrespective of the skill levels. This therefore meant that some occupations which were not being considered as professionals but do professional work are now classified in this major group.
- ➤ Engineering professionals: The physical science professionals sub-major group 21: in KNOCS has been renamed Science and Engineering professional Sub-major group 21: in KeSCO-22: The Sub-Major groups 21,22 and 23 in KNOCS 2000 were merged to create sub-major group 21: Science and engineering professionals. This sub-major group now includes the Life science professionals' Minor group 213 in KeSCO -22.
- ➤ The computing professionals were removed from sub-major group 21 in KNOCS 2000 and given its own sub-major group 25: Information and communication Technology professional. This was due to the widespread technological changes that has occurred within the ICT sector that has caused tremendous expansion of occupations within the sector

Information and Communications Technology (ICT): The convergence of ICT use and its applicability across sectors in the industry coupled with the rapid development of the ICT sector in the last 21 years since the development of KNOCS 2000 meant that occupations in the KNOCS document involved in the provision goods and services were outdated. It was therefore important that expansion be made on these categories of occupations so as allow proper distinction between those who are professionals and those who are associate professional to help bring clarity since KNOCS 2000 had a mix up of ICT related occupations.

- 57. Health service occupations: Health service occupations have been expanded in KeSCO-22 to bring in more details on health occupations to ease in international reporting and comparability of data on health workers. This was caused by difficulties in distinguishing between some occupational groups in KNOCS 2000 such as nursing.
 - ➤ To address such issues, new sub- major groups and minor groups were created in KeSCO-22 to improve on the visibility of health occupations statistics.
 - The Health and Life science professionals under KNOCS sub-Major group 24 were separated and sub-major group 22: Health professional created while Life science professionals were moved to sub-major group 21 to be under Minor group 213: Life science professionals. It was viewed that the two groups are quite distinct that they need to have their own separate groups in KeSCO-22.
 - ➤ The sub- major group 22: in KeSCO-22 was further expanded to create Minor group 221: Medical doctors which was further split into two-unit groups to separate the General Medical practitioners from Specialized Medical practitioners for ease in identifying the aspect of specialization in the profession:

- Nursing professionals were also split to create distinction between Nurse professional and Nurse associate professional as there were difficulties in distinguishing between professional nurses and associate professional nurses in KNOCS-2000.
- A new Minor group 223: Clinical practitioners and Minor group 228: Occupational safety and health professionals were introduced in KeSCO-22: It was considered that these occupations are involved in doing tasks and duties that need higher skills that are commensurate with those in major group 2.
- ➤ Opticians, Dieticians, Physiotherapists and audiologist who were only classified as Technicians and Associate professionals in KNOCS 2000 were also considered and classified in Major group 2 under Minor group 229: Other health professionals due to the tasks performed and the skills requirements.
- Traditional and Complimentary medicine professionals who use herbal medicinal plants to treat were considered to be carrying out professional tasks and classified in Major group 2 Minor group 227: In KNOCS 2000 these occupations were only covered under the technicians and associate professionals.

58. Teachers

- ➤ Teachers were graded at various levels in KNOCS 200 depending on the levels where they teach and skill possessed.
- ➤ Due to the changing occupational environment, all teachers are now considered as professionals due to the nature of tasks they perform. Those that were classified in Major group 3: Technicians and associate professionals Sub Major group 37 in KNOCS 2000 were all moved to Major group 2 under. Minor group 234: Primary school and Early childhood development teachers in KeSCO-22.
- ➤ KNOC-2000 separated teachers based on their teaching categories and skill levels. However, this was against the International standard classification of occupations system which advocates that occupations which carry out same or similar tasks and duties be classified under one homogenous group.

59. Major Group 3: Technicians and Associate Professionals

The Technicians and associate professional Major group in KNOCS 2000 was reorganized to bring in clarity between some occupational groups that were felt to have a mix up in their classifications.

60. Engineering Science associate professionals

➤ The Physical science associate professionals in sub-major group 33: in KNOCS 2000 has been shifted and merged with Engineering associate professional to form Minor group 311: Physical and Engineering science Technicians in KeSCO-22.

Life science associate professional is now Minor group 313: under sub-Major 31: Science and Engineering associate professional. The physical science professionals were deemed to be part of the engineering sciences.

61. Supervisory occupations

- ➤ In KNOCS 2000 supervisors were classified together with those they supervise. During the revision of KNOCS 2000, it was found necessary to distinguish supervisors from the workers they supervise since they do not perform same tasks and duties as the workers under their supervision. Supervisors were also found to require additional skills in some supervisory jobs.
- ➤ It was therefore necessary to create a separate new Minor group 312: Mining, Construction and Manufacturing supervisors under Sub-Major group 31: Science and Engineering associate professionals to cater for supervisory occupations in Mining, Manufacturing and Construction sectors.
- A similar consideration was used to create unit group 3341 for Office supervisors under minor group 334: Administrative and Specialized Secretaries and further in Major group 5 under sub-major group 51: Personal Service workers, Minor group 515: Building and Housekeeping supervisors was created to cater for supervisory occupations within that sector so as to distinguish them from workers they supervise.

62. Process control occupations

Occupations whose tasks are to operate machines by remote control from a central control point were removed from Major group 8: Plant and machine operators and moved to Major group 3: Technicians and associated professionals' A new Minor group 313: Process Control technicians was created to cater for them. This was in recognition of the sophisticated tasks performed by process

control operators that requires one to have higher ICT skills and the work which is more complex than just operations of plants and machinery.

In KeSCO-2022 the distinction has been considered and Chefs and Executive Cooks are now classified in Major group 3: Technicians and Associate Professionals Minor group 343: Artistic, Cultural and Culinary Associate Professionals. This is due to the higher skills requirements for these occupations.

64. Major group 4: Secretarial, Clerical Services and Related Workers

➤ The clerical occupations have been reorganized to reflect on areas where use of ICT have greatly impacted on the tasks and duties performed. Mostly affected are the clerks and secretaries who use ICT in their daily tasks. Sub-Major groups in KeSCO-2022 have been expanded from two to four to reflect on these changes.

- Sub-Major group 41: Secretaries and Office clerks in KNOCS-2000 was split into three minor groups to distinguish between the secretaries and clerks. This was to separate those who only use personal computers, word processing or typewriters to record inputs and those who in addition to using those equipment to interact with clients as they provide services.
- ➤ The Minor Groups 411: General Office Clerks, 412: Office Secretaries and 413: Keyboard Operators were created to represent the General Office Clerks, Office Secretaries and Keyboard operators to distinguish the tasks involved in these occupations. The data entry clerks are included under Minor Group 413: Keyboard Operators in KeSCO-2022.
- ➤ Minor groups under Sub-Major group 42: Client Oriented Clerks were retained. The only notable change is the transfer of from Minor group 421: Cashiers and Ticket Sellers in KNOCS-2000 to KeSCO-2022, Minor group 523: Cashiers and Ticket Clerks. New unit groups were also created in KeSCO-2022 to cover occupations that were not in KNOCS-2000 such as Unit group 4221: Travel Consultants and Clerks; Unit Group 4222: Contact Center Information Clerks and; unit group 4227: Surveyors and Market Research Interviewers.

65. Major Group 5: Service Workers, Shop and Market Sales Workers

- Major group five in KeSCO-2022 has been expanded and unit groups introduced. Most notable change is the movement of the Minor Group 911: Street Food Vendors and Related Workers from KNOCS-2000 to Minor group 521: Street and Market Salespersons and the addition of Cashiers and Tickets Sales Workers in the group in KeSCO-2022.
- Sub-major Group 52: Personal and Protective Service Workers in KNOCS-2000 has

been split. The Protective service workers has now its own Minor group 541: Protective Services Workers.

➤ Sub-major Group 53: House Stewards Caterers Waiters and Related Workers, and Sub-Major Group 54: Travel Attendants and Guides in KNOCS-2000, now forms Minor Group 532: Personal Care Workers in Health Services in KeSCO-2022.

66. Major Group 6: Skilled Agricultural, Forestry and Fisheries Workers

Occupations in Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries in KeSC0-2022 were differentiated between those involved entirely on subsistence farming agriculture and those involved in market-oriented agriculture to provide for more detailed categories and clarity in the group. In KeSCO-2022 all farmers are classified in Major group six except Managers who oversee large agricultural farms. This was due to the current practices found within the agricultural sectors, where there is pure commercial farming and an entirely subsistence farming in some communities. However, there is still a debate as to whether pure subsistence farming is realistic as there are instances in which some farmers sell the surplus of their produce. A probable solution could be to include additional questions when collecting data on this area to help clarify on the distinction.

- ➤ KNOCS-2000 had five sub-major groups while KeSCO-2022 has three Sub-Major groups.
- ➤ KNOCS-2000 had no distinction between market oriented skilled agricultural workers and subsistence agricultural workers.
- ➤ KeSCO-2022 has classified the Market-oriented Skilled Agricultural Workers under Sub-Major Group 61, while Market-oriented Skilled Forestry, Fishery and Hunting Worker are under Sub-Major group 62.
- ➤ The subsistence Agricultural Workers are under Sub-Major group 63: Subsistence Farmers, Fishers, Hunters and Gatherers

67. Major Group 7: Crafts and Related Trades Workers

KNOCS-2000 had eight Sub-Major groups. This has been reduced to five Sub-Major groups in KeSCO-2022. A notable change within the Major group is the shifting of Extraction Workers who extract minerals from underground or surface mines or quarries from KNOCS-2000 Sub-Major group 71 to Major group 8. The workers operate and use machines in their course of work in mineral extraction.

68. Printing and Handicraft workers

- Sub-Major groups 73 and 74 in KNOCS 2000 have been combined to form Sub-Major group 73: Handicraft and Printing Workers, whereas, Electrical And Electronic Crafts Workers have been moved from Sub-Major Group 72: Metal, Machinery and Related Trades Workers and a Sub-Major group 74: Electrical and Electronics Trades Workers created in KeSCO-2022. The technology applied and tasks performed necessitated the creation of a separate Sub-Major group for this category of workers. Furthermore, there was need for distinction between the Electrical Equipment Installers and Repairers and; Electronics and Telecommunications Installers and Repairers.
- ➤ KNOCS-2000 Sub-Major group 73: Precision and Handicraft Workers and Sub-Major group 74: Printing and Related Trades Workers were merged to create Sub-Major group 73: Handicraft and Printing Workers in KeSCO-2022 due to technological advancement.

➤ KNOCS-2000 Sub-Major groups 75,76,77 and 78 were merged and moved as minor Groups under Sub-Major Group 75: Food Processing, Woodworking, Garment and Other Craft and Related Trades Workers in KeSCO-2022. The rationale is that the work is carried out by hand and hand-held equipment accompanied by the understanding of work organization, materials and tools used and nature and purpose of the final product.

69. Major group 8: Plant and Machine Operators and Assemblers

- Major group 8 in KNOCS-2000 was reorganized to respond to the concern that this area in KNOCS-2000 was too detailed as compared to other groups in the document. KNOCS-2000 had 9 Sub-Major group which have been reduced to 3 Sub-Major groups in KeSCO-2022.
- ➤ The category of workers in Stationary Plant and Related Machine Operators have been classified together under Sub-Major group 81: Stationary Plant and Machine Operators as opposed to KNOCS-2000 which had given them separate Sub-Major groups
- The assemblers have retained in their own Sub-Major group 82: Assemblers, whereas, drivers and mobile plant operators have been grouped together under Sub-Major group 83: Drivers and Mobile Plant Operators.

The most significant change in the Major group was the shifting of occupations whose tasks are to operate machines using remote control from a central control point to Major Group 3: Technicians and Associate Professionals in KeSCO-2022. These occupations were classified in KNOCS-2000 Sub-Major group 85: Power Production Plant Operators. The main reason for the shifting, was the recognition of the skills requirement and the tasks performed which require more complex handling of machines than just operations of plants and machinery.

Sub-Major group 91: Sales and Services Elementary Occupations in KNOCS-2000 has been moved to Sub-Major group 95 in KeSCO-2022. Sub-Major group 94: Food Preparation Assistants was introduced in KeSCO-2022 to cater for those who prepare or serve foods.



LEGISLATORS, ADMINISTRATORS AND MANAGERS

Legislators, Administrators and Managers represent constituents, legislate and oversight organizational functions; plan, formulate and interpret policy in the public and private sectors; perform administrative and advisory functions; serve as the Head of State, advise in all matters of policy and administration, organize and direct work of departments, take policy decisions to the authorized. supervise execution implementation of policies and decisions by field or officers under their supervision; plan, direct, coordinate and evaluate the overall activities of enterprises, governments and other organizations or organizational units under them, formulate and review their policies, laws, rules and regulations.

The tasks performed by Legislators, Administrators and Managers include: representing the will of the people in exercising their sovereignty; enacting legislation and participating in the law-making function, determining the allocation of revenue and appropriating funds for expenditure; exercising oversight over revenue expenditure; advising in matters on policy and administration, organizing and directing work in public and private sector; budgeting, planning, organizing, controlling, coordinating, and managing their respective organizations or enterprises to ensure that the established objectives are realized for responsible decision-making. Supervision of other workers may be included.

Competent performance of tasks in most occupations in this major group require skills at the **4**th **KeSCO** skill level, except for Sub-major Group 14: Hospitality, Retail and Other Services Managers, for which skills at the **3**rd **and 2**nd **KeSCO** skill levels are generally applicable.

Occupations in this major group are classified into four

sub-major groups-

- 11: Legislators, Chief Executives and Senior Government Officials
- 12: Administrative and Commercial Managers
- 13: Production and Specialized Service Managers
- 14: Hospitality, Retail and other Managers

SUB-MAJOR GROUP 11: LEGISLATORS, CHIEF EXECUTIVES AND SENIOR GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS.

Legislators, Chief Executives and Senior Government Officials determine, formulate and direct policies of the national or county governments and make, rectify, amend or repeal laws, public rules and regulations; formulate and review the policies and plans, direct, coordinate and evaluate the overall activities of enterprises and other organizations with the support of other managers, perform administrative and advisory functions on all matters of policy within the sphere of responsibility; organize and direct work of ministries, departments and agencies; and supervise execution and implementation of government policies and decisions.

The tasks performed usually include: representing interests of voters in parliament, senate or county assembly; presiding over or participating in the proceedings of parliament and administrative boards of county governments; determining, formulating and directing policies of the national or county governments, making, ratifying, amending or repealing laws, public rules and regulations; formulating and advising on the policy budgets, laws and regulations of enterprises, governments and other organizations; establishing objectives for enterprises, government departments or agencies and other organizations; formulating or approving and evaluating programmes, policies and procedures for their implementation; ensuring appropriate systems and procedures are developed and implemented to provide budgetary control; authorizing material, human and financial resources to implement policies and programmes; monitoring and evaluating

performance of the organization or enterprise; selecting or approving the selection of senior staff; performing ceremonial duties and representing the enterprise, government, organization or community at official occasions and in meetings, negotiations, conventions and public hearings. Competent performance in most occupations in this major group requires skills at the 4th **KeSCO** skill level.

Occupations in this sub-major group are classified into four minor groups:

111: Legislative and Constitutional Officials

112: National and County Government Officials.

113: Senior Officials of Special Interest Organizations

MINOR GROUP 111: LEGISLATIVE AND CONSTITUTIONAL OFFICIALS

Legislative and Constitutional Officials determine, formulate and direct policies of the National and County government, act as Head of Government, legislate as members of parliament or county assembly as set out in the constitution; advise governments on policy matters, oversee the interpretation and implementation of government policies and legislation by government departments and agencies, represent their country abroad and act on its behalf, or carry out similar tasks in intergovernmental organizations. They plan, organize, direct, control and evaluate the overall activities of national or county, regional and national government departments, boards, agencies or commissions in accordance with legislation and policies established by government and legislative bodies. Competent performance in most occupations in this sub-major group requires skills at the 4th KeSCO skill level.

The tasks performed in this minor group usually include: presiding over or participating in the proceedings of parliament or county assembly and administrative boards of county governments; determining, formulating and directing policies of the national or county

governments; making, ratifying, amending or repealing laws, public rules and regulations;

1110: Legislators and Constitutional Officials

UNIT GROUP 1110: LEGISLATORS AND CONSTITUTIONAL OFFICIALS

Legislators and Constitutional Officials determine, formulate and direct policies of the national and county government and make, rectify, amend or repeal laws, public rules and regulations; act as members of parliament or as set out in the constitution of the country, and advise governments on policy matters; oversee the interpretation and implementation of government policies and legislation by government departments and agencies, represent their country abroad and act on its behalf, or carry out similar tasks in intergovernmental organizations. They plan, organize, direct, control and evaluate the overall activities of national or county, regional and national government departments, boards, agencies or commissions in accordance with legislation and policies established by government and legislative bodies.

Tasks performed in this unit group usually include: being the Head of State, Government and Commanderin-Chief of the armed forces; being the principal assistant to the President, presiding over or participating in the proceedings of legislative bodies and administrative councils of national, state or county governments or legislative assemblies; determining, formulating and directing policies of national, state, regional or local governments; making, ratifying, amending or repealing laws, public rules and regulations within a statutory or constitutional framework; serving on government administrative boards or official committees; investigating matters of concern to the public and promoting the interests of the constituencies which they represent; attending community functions and

meetings to provide service to the community; understand public opinion and providing information on government plans; negotiating with other legislators and representatives of interest groups in order to reconcile differing interests, and to create policies and agreements as members of the government; directing senior administrators and officials of government departments and agencies in the interpretation and implementation of government policies.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one must be a Kenyan Citizen for a period of not less than ten years should at least possess at tertiary level training in the relevant field.

signing of treaties and agreements; administering the provision of services to Kenyan citizens overseas and offering advice to Kenyan Government on relations with other countries; Being in charge of the overall and independent command of the National Police Service and responsible for all matters relating to the command and discipline of the National Police Service and representing the government in regional or intergovernmental organizations.



They apply scientific knowledge relating to physics and astronomy in industrial, medical, military or other fields.

Tasks performed in this unit group include:conducting research and improving or developing concepts, theories, instrumentation, software and operational methods; conducting experiments, tests and analysis on the structure and properties of matter in fields such as mechanics, thermodynamics, electronics, communications, power generation and distribution, aerodynamics, optics and lasers, remote sensing, medicine, sonics, magnetism, and nuclear physics; evaluating results of investigations and experiments and expressing conclusions, mainly using mathematical techniques and models; applying principles, techniques and processes to develop or improve industrial, medical, military and other practical applications of the principles and techniques of physics or astronomy; ensuring the safe and effective delivery of radiation (ionising and non-ionising) to patients to achieve a diagnostic or therapeutic result as prescribed by a medical practitioner; ensuring the accurate measurement characterization of physical quantities used in medical applications; testing, commissioning and evaluating equipment used in applications such as imaging, medical treatment and dosimetry; advising and consulting with medical practitioners and other health care professionals in optimizing the balance between the beneficial and deleterious effects of observing, analyzing and interpreting radiation; celestial phenomena and developing methods, numerical models and techniques to extend knowledge of fields such as navigation, satellite communication, space exploration, celestial bodies and cosmic radiation; developing, implementing and maintaining standards and protocols for the measurement of physical phenomena and for the use of nuclear technology in industrial and medical applications; preparing scientific papers and reports.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, formal training at tertiary level and above, in one or more fields under physical sciences and possession of in-depth advanced knowledge of physics and astronomy is required. Geologist and Geophysicists conduct research and improve or develop concepts, theories and operational methods or apply scientific knowledge relating to geology and geophysics in such fields as oil, gas and mineral exploration and extraction, water conservation, civil engineering, telecommunications and navigation, and assessment and mitigation of the effects of development and waste disposal projects on the environment.

Tasks performed in this unit group include:conducting research and improving or developing concepts, theories, and operational methods related to geology and geophysics; studying composition and structure of the Earth's crust, examining rocks, minerals, fossils and other materials, to determine processes affecting the development of the Earth, trace evolution of past life, establish nature and chronology of geological formations and assess their commercial applications; interpreting research data and preparing geological reports, maps, charts and diagrams, reports and papers; applying geological knowledge to problems encountered in civil engineering projects such as the construction of dams, bridges, tunnels, and large buildings; and land reclamation projects; using various remote sensing programs to investigate and measure seismic, gravitational, electrical, thermal, and magnetic forces affecting the Earth; estimating weight, size and mass of the Earth and composition and structure of its interior, and studying the nature, activity and predictability of volcanoes, glaciers and earthquakes; charting the Earth's magnetic field and applying this and other collected data for broadcasting, navigation and other purposes; studying and measuring physical properties of seas and the atmosphere and their interrelationship, such as the exchange of thermal energy; locating and determining the nature and extent of oil, gas and mineral deposits using seismological, gravimetric, magnetic, electrical or radiometric methods; identifying deposits of construction materials and determining their characteristics and suitability for use as concrete aggregates, road fill or for other applications; researching the movement, distribution and physical properties of ground and surface waters; advising in areas such as waste management, route and site selection and the restoration of contaminated sites.

developing concepts, theories and operational methods related to the composition, structure and dynamics of the atmosphere and preparing scientific papers and reports on the outcome of this research.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires formal training at tertiary level and above in meteorology and possession of high level technical skills and knowledge about composition, structure and dynamics of the atmosphere are required to aid in preparation of short-term or long-term weather forecasts used in aviation, shipping, agriculture and other areas and for the information of the general public. In addition, possession of complex problem-solving, analytical thinking and excellent verbal communication skills is also required.

Tasks performed in this unit group include: Conducting physical examinations of patients and interviewing them and their families to determine their health status ordering laboratory tests, X-rays and other diagnostic procedures and analysing findings to determine the nature of disorders or illnesses; providing continuing medical care for patients including prescribing, administering, counselling on and monitoring curative treatments and preventive measures; performing surgery and other clinical procedures; advising individuals, families and communities on health, nutrition and lifestyle which aid prevention or treatment of disease and disorders; providing referrals to patients and families for specialized care in hospitals, rehabilitation centres or other types of health care centres; identifying, managing and providing referrals for complications before, during and after childbirth; recording patients' medical information and history and exchanging information with specialist practitioners and other health workers as required for continuing medical care; reporting births, deaths and notifiable diseases to government authorities to meet legal and professional requirements; conducting research in human health and medical services and disseminating the findings such as through scientific reports planning and participating in programs designed to prevent the occurrence and spread of common diseases.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, formal training at tertiary level and above in Medicine and Surgery in addition to postgraduate clinical training or equivalent is required. research into specific human disorders and illnesses and preventive or curative methods and disseminating the findings such as through scientific reports; planning and participating in programs designed to prevent the occurrence and spread of specific diseases.

Competent performance of tasks in most occupations in this minor group requires skills at the 3rd KeSCO skill level. Registration with professional body may be required.

education activities in clinical and community settings

TECHNICIANS AND ASSOCIATE PROFESSIONALS

Technicians and Associate Professionals perform technical and related tasks associated with research and the application of scientific or artistic concepts and operational methods. It covers those occupations whose main tasks require sound educational and training background. They apply principles and practices necessary for technical support to professionals as well as assuming operational responsibility in Government or business operations. Most occupations in this major group require skills at the 3rd KeSCO skill level. Some occupations in Minor Group 322: Nursing and Midwifery Associate Professionals and Minor Group 323: Traditional and Complementary Medicine Associate Professionals require skills at the 2nd KeSCO skill level.

Tasks performed by Technicians and Associate Professionals usually include: undertaking and carrying out technical works connected with research and the application of concepts and operational methods in the fields of physical sciences including engineering and technology, life sciences including the medical profession, and social sciences and humanities; initiating and carrying out various technical services related to trade, social work, finance and administration including enforcing of government laws and regulations; providing technical support for the arts and entertainment; participating in sporting activities; executing some religious tasks. Supervision of other workers may be included.

Competent performance of tasks in most occupations in this submajor group requires skills at the 3rd KeSCO skill level.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires middle level training in applied science or chemical technology, physical science or physics. In addition, possession of analytical skills, and ability to use and maintain technical is necessary. Registration with a professional body may also be necessary.

Mining and Drilling supervisors, coordinate mining and quarrying operations of miners and drillers working in the underground tunnels. They control and schedule the activities of workers.

Tasks performed include:- flying and navigating aircraft in accordance with established control and operating procedures; preparing and submitting flight plans or examining standard flight plans; controlling the operation of mechanical, electrical and electronic equipment and ensuring that all instruments and controls work properly; applying knowledge of principles and practices of flying in order to identify and solve problems arising in the course of their work; examining maintenance records and conducting inspections to ensure that aircraft are mechanically sound, maintenance has been performed and that all equipment is operational; signing necessary certificates and maintaining official records of flight; obtaining briefings and clearances before flights and maintaining contact with air traffic or flight control during flight.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires middle level training in

commanding and navigating aircraft, performing technical functions to ensure safe and efficient movements of aircraft and or commercial pilot training coupled with critical thinking and analytical skills.

UNIT GROUP 3154: AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS

Air Traffic Controllers' use radio, radar and lighting systems to direct aircraft movements in air space and on the ground and provide information relevant to the operation of aircraft.

Tasks performed are directing and controlling aircraft approaching and leaving airport and their movement on the ground; directing and controlling aircraft operating in designated airspace sectors; examining and approving flight plans; informing flight crew and operations staff about weather conditions, operational facilities, flight plans and air traffic; applying knowledge of principles and practices of air traffic control in order to identify and solve problems arising in the course of

their work; initiating and organizing emergency, search and rescue services and procedures; directing activities of all aircraft and service vehicles on or near airport runways; maintaining radio and telephone contact with adjacent control towers, terminal control units and other control centres, and coordinating the movement of aircraft into adjoining areas.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires middle level training in air traffic control and in addition critical thinking and analysis skills are necessary.

Tasks performed are: carrying out technical duties related to the development of electronic and computerized air navigation systems and equipment, and testing prototypes; providing technical help in the design and layout of specific interface circuitry of air navigation and aircraft detection tracking systems; preparing and contributing to the preparation of cost estimates and technical and training specifications for air traffic control and safety equipment; providing or assisting with the technical supervision of construction, installation and operation of ground-based air navigation equipment and its maintenance and repair to ensure that standards and specifications are met; applying the knowledge and skills of air traffic safety engineering principles and practices in order to identify and solve problems arising in the course of their work;

developing, modifying and debugging system software; modifying existing ground-based air navigation systems and equipment to adapt them to new air traffic control procedures, in order to improve capability, reliability and integrity, or to facilitate air traffic control procedures and airspace designation; controlling, monitoring and certifying communication navigation and surveillance air traffic management equipment, and calibrating the ground-based air navigation system to ensure maximum accuracy and safety of flight, take-off and landing operations; providing technical training and supervising other workers.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires middle level training in aeronautical engineering or related field, good communications skill, critical thinking and analysis,

SUB-MAJOR GROUP 32: HEALTH ASSOCIATE PROFESSIONALS

Health associate professionals perform technical and practical tasks to support diagnosis and treatment of illness, disease, injuries and impairments in humans and animals, and support implementation of health care, treatment and referral plans usually established by medical, veterinary, nursing and other health professionals. Competent performance in most occupations in this sub-major group requires skills at the 3rd KeSCO skill level.

The tasks performed include: assisting in examination of patients, administering prescribed medicine, monitoring patients' progress, discussing cases with medical practitioners and social professionals and maintaining records of their activities. They also inspect and administer public health programmes to local authorities. Other tasks include operating and maintaining medical

equipment's, x-rays and optical machines.

MINOR GROUP 321: MEDICAL AND PHARMACEUTICAL TECHNICIANS

Medical and Pharmaceutical Technicians carry out in limited scope advisory, diagnostic, preventive and curative medical tasks, dispense and prepare medicaments, lotions and mixtures under the guidance of pharmacists and medical doctors in pharmacies, hospitals and dispensaries. They work independently or with the guidance and supervision of medical doctors in institutions or in the field as part of the Public Health Service, and may work mainly with diseases and disorders common in their region, or mainly apply specific types of treatment. Competent performance in most occupations in this sub-major group requires skills at the 3rd KeSCO Skill level.

The tasks usually performed include: -Testing and operating radiographic, ultrasound and other medical imaging equipment; administering radiopharmaceuticals or radiation to patients to detect or treat diseases; performing clinical tests on specimens of bodily fluids and tissues; operates, calibrates and maintains equipment used in quantitative and qualitative analysis, such as spectrophotometers, calorimeters, flame photometers and computer-controlled analysers; preparing medications and other pharmaceutical compounds under the guidance of pharmacists; designing, fitting, servicing and repairing medical and dental devices and

appliances. reporting results to medical practitioners and other health professionals; analyse samples of biological material for chemical content or reaction; analyse laboratory findings to check the accuracy of the results; obtains specimens, cultivates, isolates and identifying microorganisms for analysis.

Medical Imaging and Therapeutic equipment technicians test and operate radiographic, ultrasound and other medical imaging equipment to produce images of body structures for the diagnosis and treatment of injury, disease and other impairments. They may administer radiation treatments to patients under the supervision of a radiologist or other health professional.

Tasks performed include - operating or overseeing operation of radiologic, ultrasound and magnetic imaging equipment to produce images of the body for diagnostic purposes; explaining procedures, observing and positioning patients, and using protection devices to ensure safety and comfort during examination, scan or treatment; positioning imaging or treatment equipment, monitoring video displays, and adjusting settings and controls according to technical specifications; reviewing and evaluating developed X-rays, videotape, or computer-generated information to determine if images are satisfactory for diagnostic purposes, and recording results of procedures; monitoring patients' conditions and reactions, reporting abnormal signs to a medical practitioner; measuring and recording radiation dosage or radiopharmaceuticals received and used for patients,

following prescriptions issued by a medical practitioner: administering, detecting and mapping radiopharmaceuticals or radiation in patients' bodies, using radioisotope, camera or other equipment for diagnosing and treating diseases; recording and disposing of radioactive materials and storing radiopharmaceuticals, following radiation safety procedures.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires middle level training in radiography, medical imaging or related field. Critical thinking, analysis and communication skills are also important.

Tasks performed include conducting chemical analysis of body fluids, including blood, urine and spinal fluid, to determine presence of normal and abnormal components; operating, calibrating and maintaining equipment used in quantitative and qualitative analysis, such as spectrophotometers, calorimeters, flame

photometers and computer-controlled analysers: entering data from analysis of laboratory tests and clinical results into record-keeping systems, and reporting results to medical practitioners and other health professionals; analysing samples of biological material for chemical content or reaction; setting up, cleaning and maintaining laboratory equipment; analysing laboratory findings to check the accuracy of the results; establishing and monitoring programmes to ensure the accuracy of laboratory results, and developing, standardizing, evaluating and modifying procedures, techniques and tests used in the analysis of specimens; obtaining specimens, cultivating, isolating and identifying microorganisms for analysis; examining cells stained with dve to locate abnormalities; inoculating fertilized eggs, broths, or other bacteriological media with organisms.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires middle level training in medical laboratory, laboratory science or related fields. Critical thinking and analysis skill are paramount with good interpersonal communication and computer knowledge. Registration with a professional body may be is necessary.

Pharmaceutical Technicians and Assistants dispense and prepare medicaments, lotions and mixtures under the guidance of pharmacists, in pharmacies, hospitals and dispensaries. Pharmaceutical technicians and assistants perform a variety of tasks associated with dispensing medicinal products under the guidance of a pharmacist or other health professional in pharmacies, hospitals and dispensaries.

Tasks performed include preparing medications and other pharmaceutical compounds under the guidance of a pharmacist or other health professional; dispensing medicines and drugs to clients and giving written and oral instructions on their use, as prescribed by medical doctors, veterinarians or other health professionals; receiving prescriptions or refill requests from health professionals and verifying that information is complete and accurate according to medical record-keeping standards; maintaining proper storage and security conditions for drugs; filling and labelling containers with prescribed medications; assisting clients by answering questions, locating items or referring them to a pharmacist for medication information; pricing and filing prescriptions that have been filled and establishing and maintaining patient records, including lists of medications taken by individual patients; ordering, labelling, and counting stocks of medications, chemicals and supplies, and entering inventory data into record-keeping systems: cleaning and preparing equipment and containers used to prepare and dispense medicines and pharmaceutical compounds.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires a at least middle level training in pharmaceutical technology. Critical thinking and analysis skill are paramount with good interpersonal communication and computer knowledge. Registration with a professional body may be necessary.

Medical and Dental Prosthetic Technicians design, fit, service and repair medical and dental devices and appliances following prescriptions or instructions established by a health professional. They may service a wide range of support instruments to correct physical medical or dental problems, such as neck braces, orthopaedic splints, artificial limbs, hearing aids, arch supports, dentures, and dental crowns and bridges.

Tasks performed include examining, interviewing and measuring patients in order to determine their appliance needs, and to identify factors that could affect appliance fit; conferring with medical and dental practitioners in order to formulate specifications and prescriptions for devices and appliances; interpreting prescriptions or specifications to determine the type of product or device to be fabricated, and the materials and tools that will be required; making or receiving casts or impressions of patients' torsos, limbs, mouths or teeth for use as fabrication patterns; designing and making orthotic and prosthetic devices using materials such as thermoplastic and thermosetting materials, metal alloys and leather, and hand and power tools: fitting appliances and devices to patients, testing and evaluating them, and making adjustments for proper fit, function and comfort; repairing, modifying and maintaining medical and dental prosthetic and supportive devices, according to specifications; bending, forming and shaping fabric or material so that it conforms to prescribed contours needed to fabricate structural components; fabricating full and partial dentures and constructing mouth guards, crowns, metal clasps, inlays, bridgework and other aids; instructing patients in the use and care of prosthetic or orthotic devices.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires middle level training in dental

technology, bio-medical engineering and related fields. Registration with a professional body may be necessary

Nursing and Midwifery Associate Professionals provide basic nursing and personal care for people who are physically or mentally ill, disabled or infirm, and for others in need of care due to potential risks to health including before, during and after childbirth. They generally work under the supervision of, and in support of, implementation of health care, treatment and referrals plans established by medical, nursing, midwifery and other health professionals and in the absence of medical doctors or professional nurses, deal with emergencies. Competent performance in most occupations in this submajor group requires skills at the 3rd **KeSCO** skill level

Tasks performed usually include: providing nursing and personal care, treatment and advice to patients according to care plans established by health professionals; assisting professional nurses, midwives and medical doctors in administering medication and treatments; cleaning wounds and applying surgical dressings; providing advice to individuals, families and communities on topics related to health, contraception, pregnancy and childbirth; assessing progress during pregnancy and childbirth, providing or assisting in delivery care and recognizing signs and symptoms requiring referral to a health professional; providing care and support to women and newborns following childbirth.

Tasks performed include; providing advice to women, families and communities on health, nutrition, hygiene, exercise, birth and emergency plans, breastfeeding, infant care, family planning and contraception, lifestyle and other topics related to pregnancy and childbirth; assessing progress during pregnancy and childbirth, and recognizing signs and symptoms requiring referral to a health professional; providing delivery care, usually only in the absence of identified potential complications, or assisting medical doctors or midwifery professionals with delivery care; providing care and support to women and newborns following childbirth, monitoring their health status, and identifying signs and symptoms requiring referral to a health professional.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires basic training in midwifery.

MINOR GROUP 323: TRADITIONAL AND COMPLEMENTARY MEDICINE ASSOCIATE PROFESSIONALS

Traditional and Complementary Medicine Associate Professionals prevent, care for and treat human physical and mental illnesses, disorders and injuries using herbal and other therapies based on theories, beliefs and experiences originating in specific cultures. They administer treatments using traditional techniques and medicaments, either acting

independently or according to therapeutic care plans established by a traditional medicine or other health professional.

Tasks performed usually include: examining patients and interviewing them and their families to determine their health status and the nature of physical or mental disorders or illnesses or other ailments; recommending and providing care and treatment for illnesses and other ailments using traditional techniques and medicaments, such as physical manipulation and exercises, blood-letting using natural vessels, and preparations using herbs, plants, insects and animal extracts; administering treatments such as acupuncture, ayurvedic, homeopathic and herbal medicine according to therapeutic care plans and procedures usually developed by a traditional medicine or other health professional; providing care and treatment for physical injuries such as setting and healing fractured and dislocated bones using traditional methods of physical manipulation and herbal therapies; advising individuals, families and the community on health, nutrition, hygiene, lifestyle and other issues to maintain or improve health and wellbeing; referring patients to, and exchanging information with, other health care providers to ensure comprehensive and continuing care.

They administer treatments using traditional techniques and

medicaments, either acting independently or according to therapeutic care plans established by a traditional medicine or other health professional.

Tasks performed include examining patients and interviewing them and their families to determine their health status and the nature of physical or mental disorders or illnesses or other ailments; recommending and providing care and treatment for illnesses and other ailments using traditional techniques and medicaments, such as physical manipulation and exercises, bloodletting using natural vessels, and preparations using herbs, plants, insects and animal extracts; administering ayurvedic. treatments such as acupuncture, homeopathic and herbal medicine according to therapeutic care plans and procedures usually developed by a traditional medicine or other health professional; providing care and treatment for physical injuries such as setting and healing fractured and dislocated bones using traditional methods of physical manipulation and herbal therapies; advising individuals, families and the community on health, nutrition, hygiene, lifestyle and other issues to maintain or improve health and well-being; referring patients to, and exchanging information with, other health care providers to ensure comprehensive and continuing care.

For effective and efficient performance of tasks in this unit group, one requires at least an in-depth understanding of anatomy and physiology, as well as detailed knowledge of herbs and their preparation. They also need excellent interpersonal skills, strong business skills and organizational ability besides on-the-job training.

MINOR GROUP 324: VETERINARY TECHNICIANS AND ASSISTANTS

Veterinary Technicians and Assistants carry out but only to a limited extent, advisory, diagnostic, preventive and curative veterinary duties normally under the direction of a veterinary doctor. They care for animals under treatment and in temporary residence at veterinary facilities, perform routine procedures and assist veterinarians to perform major procedures and operations.

The tasks performed in this minor group usually include advising communities and individuals on the treatment of animals and their diseases and injuries; conducting examinations of animals to make diagnoses or refer more difficult cases to veterinarians when needed; treating ill or injured animals, especially for common diseases and disorders; cleaning and sterilising examination tables and instruments and preparing materials used in the examination and treatment of animals; carrying out technical tasks connected with artificial insemination of animals; getting animals ready for examination or treatment and restraining or holding them during treatment; assisting veterinarians to administer anaesthetics and oxygen during treatment: placing animals in cages for recovery from operations and monitoring their condition. Competent performance in most occupations in this minor group requires skills at the 3rd KeSCO skill level

Veterinary Technicians and Assistants advise communities and individuals on the treatment of

animals and their diseases and injuries; conduct examinations of animals to make diagnoses or refer more difficult cases to veterinarians; treat ill or injured animals, especially for common diseases and disorders; clean and sterilise examination tables and instruments and prepare materials used in the examination and treatment of animals; carry out technical tasks connected with artificial insemination of animals; get animals ready for examination or treatment and restrain or hold them during treatment; assist veterinarians to administer anaesthetics and oxygen during treatment; place animals in cages for recovery from operations and monitor their condition.

Other health associate professionals perform technical tasks and provide support services in dentistry, medical records administration, community health, the correction of reduced visual acuity, physiotherapy, environmental health, emergency medical treatment and other activities to support and promote human health.

Tasks performed usually include: providing basic care services for the prevention and treatment of diseases and disorders of the teeth and mouth; advising communities and individuals on hygiene, diet and other preventive measures to reduce potential risks to health; compiling and maintaining patients' medical records to document condition and treatment and to provide data for research, billing, cost control and care improvement: assisting families to develop the necessary skills and resources to improve their health status; providing advice and education on sanitation and hygiene to limit the spread of infectious diseases: fitting and dispensing optical lenses; investigating the implementation of rules and regulations relating to environmental and occupational factors that may potentially affect human health; massaging the soft tissues of the body; showing patients to examination rooms and preparing them for examination; attending and responding to accidents and emergencies and to requests for medical assistance. Tasks performed are advising communities and individuals on dental hygiene, diet and other preventive measures to reduce potential risks to oral health; conducting visual and physical examinations of patients' mouths, teeth and related structures to assess oral health status; identifying cases of patients with poor oral health or oral disease requiring referral to a dentist or other health professional; assisting dentists during complex dental procedures; providing fluoride treatments, cleaning and removing deposits from teeth, preparing cavities and placing fillings, administering local anaesthesia, and performing other types of basic or routine clinical dental procedures; preparing, cleaning and sterilizing dental instruments, equipment and materials used in the examination and treatment of patients; getting patients ready for examination or treatment, including explaining procedures and correct positioning; and taking impressions of the mouth and dental radiographs to support diagnosis and fitting of dental prosthetics.

Tasks performed are providing information to families and communities on a range of health issues including nutrition, hygiene, infant and child care, immunizations, family planning, risk factors and prevention of common infectious diseases, poisoning prevention, first aid for treatment of simple and common ailments, substance abuse, domestic violence and other topics; visiting families in their homes to provide information on the health, social and other services available and support them in gaining access to these services; visiting families who do not usually access medical establishments to monitor on a regular basis certain conditions such as progress with pregnancy, child growth and development, and environmental sanitation; distributing to households medical supplies for the prevention and treatment of

endemic diseases such as malaria, pneumonia and diarrhoeal diseases, and instructing family and community members in the use of these products; conducting outreach efforts to groups who do not usually access medical establishments with information and basic medical supplies for prevention and management of certain health conditions for which they are most at risk, such as HIV/AIDS and other communicable diseases; and collecting data from households and communities who do not usually access medical establishments for purposes of patient monitoring and referral and reporting to meet health regulations.

Instructs patients on remedial exercises to correct muscle ailments and deficiencies where functional movement is threatened by injury, disease or impairment.

They work independently or with the guidance and supervision of medical doctors in institutions or in the field as part of the Public Health Service, and may work mainly with diseases and disorders common in their region, or mainly apply specific types of treatment.

Tasks performed are preparing patients for medical

examinations and assisting doctors in providing treatment; performing to a limited extent the tasks of a general physician within a public health service or institution; making medical examinations; referring patients to a physician or hospital if necessary; prescribing medicines and administering drugs. May inoculate persons with vaccines to provide immunity from diseases; interviewing patients and their families to obtain information on their health status and medical history; assisting medical doctors and other health professionals to examine and treat patients, including measuring and recording vital signs, administering medications and performing routine clinical procedures such as giving injections and removing sutures; preparing and handling medical instruments and supplies, including sterilizing instruments and disposing of contaminated supplies in accordance with safety procedures; collecting blood, tissue or other specimens, and preparing them for laboratory testing; providing information to patients and families on health care topics including medications prescribed by a medical doctor or other health professional; providing prescription and drug refill information to pharmacies; maintaining cleanliness of patient waiting and examination rooms; and scheduling appointments with patients, and preparing documentation required for billing, reporting and insurance purposes.

Tasks performed are carrying out inspections in food processing environments from a food safety stand point, checking and controlling food products and processes to ensure compliance with regulations governing safety and health; monitoring businesses and public facilities to enforce local and state health checking waste-disposal regulations; ventilation and water systems; and issuing fines and suspend business licenses, a key role in protecting the public from many common health threats; carrying out regular workplace inspections; undertaking safety and health risk assessments; conducting job safety analysis; conducting assessment or investigations on accidents or incidences; preparing health and safety policies, programs and strategies; ensuring safety and health policies and procedures are being properly implemented; conducting internal safety and health audits; recommending changes to protect workers, and educating employees on how to prevent health problems through the use of safety training programs; identifying contaminants in a variety of settings including air, water and soil; conducting inspections, investigations and sampling studies, and coordinating testing of these samples through a laboratory and recommending the necessary abatement options; inspecting areas of production, processing, transport, handling, storage and sale of products to ensure conformity with government and other rules, regulations and standards; advising

enterprises and the general public on the implementation of government and other rules and regulations concerning hygiene, sanitation, purity and grading of primary products, food, drugs, cosmetics and similar goods; and providing technical assistance and advising on measures to restore and or improve sanitary conditions, and supervising their implementation.

CRAFT AND RELATED TRADES WORKERS

Craft and Related Trades Workers apply practical and technical skills in the fields of construction and maintenance of buildings; form metal; erect metal structures; set machine tools, or make, fit, maintain and repair machinery, equipment or tools; carry out printing work; install, fit and maintain electrical wiring systems, machinery and other electrical apparatus; produce or process foodstuffs, textiles, or wooden, metal and other articles, including handicraft goods. The work is carried out by hand and by hand-powered and other tools which are used to reduce the amount of physical effort and time required for specific tasks, as well as to improve the quality of the products. The tasks call for an understanding of all stages of the production process, the materials and tools used, and the nature and purpose of the final product.

The tasks usually include: constructing, maintaining and repairing of buildings and other structures; casting, welding and shaping metal; installing and erecting metal structures; making machinery, tools, equipment, and other metal articles; setting for operators, or setting and operating various machine tools; fitting, maintaining and repairing industrial machinery, engines and vehicles, electrical, electronic and solar powered instruments and other equipment; making precision instruments, jewellery, household and other precious-metal articles, pottery, glass and related products; producing handicrafts; executing printing work; producing and processing foodstuffs and various articles made of wood, textiles, leather and related materials. Supervision of other workers may be included. Competent performance in most occupations in this major group requires skills at the 2nd and 3rd **KeSCO** skill levels.

Tasks performed by workers in this sub-major group usually include: constructing, maintaining and repairing buildings and other structures, using traditional and/or modern building techniques; constructing and repairing foundations, walls and structures of brick, stone and similar materials; breaking quarried stone into slabs or blocks; cutting, shaping and finishing stone for building, ornamental, monumental and other purposes; erecting reinforced concrete frameworks and structures as well as finishing and repairing cement surfaces; cutting, shaping, assembling and maintaining wooden

structures and fittings; plumbing, piping, insulating electrical system in building and other structures; painting surfaces; performing miscellaneous construction and building maintenance tasks. structures, clearance lights, control panels, control cabling and wiring, and other electrical and mechanical devices; repairing and setting optical instruments such as microscopes, telescopes, theodolites and sextants; checking whether assembled units conform to specifications and ensuring stipulated performance and sensitivity by standard tests.

Tasks performed include: fabricating and assembling musical instruments and instrument parts of wood, ebonite, metal, leather and other materials; repairing or replacing musical instrument parts and components such as strings, bridges, felts and keys, using hand and power tools; playing and inspecting instruments to evaluate their sound quality and to locate any defects; adjusting string tensions to achieve proper tone or pitch of stringed instruments; adjusting lips, reeds, or toe holes of organ pipes, using hand tools, to regulate airflow and loudness of sound; tuning and servicing pipe organs by adjusting pitch of organ A pipes to conform with pitch of the tuning fork and adjusting pitch of other pipes with reference to pitch of tuned pipes; installing new drumheads in percussion instruments; tuning accordions by aurally comparing pitch of reeds with master reeds and filing reeds to obtain standard pitch; aligning pads and keys on reed or wind instruments; tuning percussion instruments to required pitch by tightening or loosening cords holding leather pieces fixed atop or at both ends of the instrument; assembling and installing new pipe organs and pianos in buildings.

to be engraved; engraving and printing patterns, ornamental designs, etchings, trademarks, figures or lettering onto flat or curved surfaces of a wide variety of metal, glass, plastic, or ceramic items; and etching decorative designs, calibration markings and other figures on glass articles.

make parts for garments and other fur articles; trimming excess material or cutting threads off finished products, such as cutting loose ends of a finished product; positioning leather on cutting bed of machine, maximizing usage according to skin grain, skin flaws and skin stretch; performing pattern-making, marking and cutting tasks in the manufacture of other products such as soft furnishings and canvas goods.

Wood Processing and Papermaking Plant Operators monitor, operate and control machinery to saw wood, cut veneer, make plywood, produce pulp and paper and to otherwise prepare wood, pulp and paper for further use.

Tasks performed usually include: examining logs and rough lumber to determine size, condition, quality and other characteristics to decide best lumber cuts to carry out, or operating automated equipment to convey logs through laser scanners which determine the most productive and profitable cutting patterns; sorting, stacking and placing logs and wood billets onto conveyors and lathes from trucks for processing into chips, veneers and pulp; operating and monitoring screening equipment, bleaching equipment, digesters, mixing tanks, washers and other pulp processing machinery and equipment to carry out one or more cellulose processing steps; operating and monitoring papermaking and finishing process machinery and equipment to dry, calender, laminate, coat, slit, trim, wind or carry out other papermaking and finishing

process steps; observing equipment and machinery panel indicators, gauges, level indicators and other equipment instruments to detect machinery and equipment malfunctions and ensure process steps are carried out according to specifications; operating and monitoring plywood core-laying machines and hotplate plywood presses and machines which cut veneer; transporting processed wood products to work areas.

ELEMENTARY OCCUPATIONS

pedaling or hand-guiding vehicles to transport passengers and goods, driving animal-drawn vehicles or machinery; selling goods (excluding food) in streets and public places, or from door to door; providing various street services; sweeping streets and similar places; delivering messages or goods; carrying luggage; supervision of other workers may be included. Competent performance in most occupations in this sub-major group require skills at the 1st KeSCO skill level.

Tasks performed in this sub-major group usually include: sweeping or vacuum cleaning; dusting, washing and polishing floors, furniture and other objects; removing rubbish and emptying containers, bins and trays; taking care of linen, clothes and bed making; helping with preparation of meals and cleaning
