HOT OCCUPATIONS IN THE KENYAN LABOUR MARKET JULY 1ST TO SEPTEMBER 30TH, 2019

This report provides a quarterly analysis of job advertisements published in the Daily Nation, The Standard and The East African Newspapers, from 1st July to 30th September 2019. The total number of job vacancies posted in the said newspapers for the period was 1233. Out of these, vacancies, electrical engineering technicians accounted for 11 percent followed by Electronics and Telecommunication Engineering Technicians at 10 percent, while University and post secondary teachers/lecturers and specialized departmental managers each accounted for 8 percent

The occupations most featured in the newspapers over the reference period are tabulated here below


